HOW WILL THEY KNOW WHO TO CALL?



**IN CASE OF EMERGENCY
IT COULD SAVE YOUR LIFE!!**

ICE stands for “In Case of Emergency”

As much as people try to stay safe, accidents and emergencies can happen. When they do, getting timely information is critical.

If you have a medical emergency, would emergency personnel know who to contact on your behalf?

Identification is a significant problem in hospitals, when someone comes to the hospital unconscious, their wallets are often gone through to find their identity, "But it often doesn't have emergency contacts."

There is no simpler way of letting the emergency personnel know who to contact should you be involved in an accident than by using ICE. This is a simple way to make sure emergency contact and critical patient information is located in the event of an emergency.

ICE can be used in most emergency situations:

If you are unconscious or unable to communicate, emergency contacts can give first responders vital medical history, special medical needs, and other critical information, allowing for more thorough and rapid medical attention.

If you have special medical needs, including allergies, diabetes, and/or heart conditions, a designated emergency contact can relay important medical information to emergency personnel, resulting in proper medical attention.

When children use ICE, their parent, guardian, or medical provider can be contacted quicker, allowing for accurate and critical medical information to be known to the provider. Loved ones can be with their child sooner, creating less distress for the child, and family.

How do I use ICE?

There are many ways to use ICE.

Cell Phone

1. On the cell phone add a new contact to the phone book
2. First enter the letters “ICE” then type contact’s name, followed by their phone number
3. Affix an ICE sticker on the phone

No Cell Phone

There are wallet cards available, which will have emergency contact information and should be carried at all times.

Children often go on school outings or places with friends or other family members and don't have a photo ID or emergency contact information on them.


If there was an emergency, and both the child and other people they are with were unable to communicate, how would the first responders or hospital know who they are or how to treat them?

By doing the students in ICE, the first responders will have their emergency contact information and they will be able to identify the child by their picture on the card.

The cards could be placed in the kid's wallet, backpack, duffle bag or notebooks.

What is Arizona ElderBuilders?

Arizona has seen overwhelming growth in our aged population. Many people retire to our area because the "living is easy" and the "price is right". In just a few years they find their expenses rising, their health deteriorating and their family support system thousands of miles away. This is when they turn to community support systems for help. When rural elder service program directors began meeting in 1997, a seed was planted that together they could maintain and increase critical services most cost effectively by sharing problem-solving methods, program development strategies, and staff. In 1998, the seed sprouted through the formal development of the ElderBuilders Partnership (EB). Since that time, EB has established 3 interfaith coalitions, 4 adult day centers, home health services, and an RSVP Program across five AZ counties. In 2003, ElderBuilders was featured in the *International Journal of Humanities & Peace* as an innovative program that is about people helping people.
